

### A MESSAGE FROM YOUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



It is hard to believe that almost half the year has gone by already in 2021, as I am writing this newsletter I hope everything is well and all are safe from the COVID pandemic. It has been very difficult sixteen months since everything

started to shutdown; we are hoping to get back to some kind of normal life as we were use to.

The highway department has a very busy construction season planed in 2021 along with all the normal green waste pickups every month, repairing drainage problems, cleaning ditches, and other things we do throughout the year. We would have hoped that the weather would be consistently warmer by now but we will be moving ahead with our projects as soon as possible. As our road construction projects progress this year call with any questions you may have; highway department # 315-826-7014. In past years some ask why we have to do things the way we do them, with our paving work in mind the first thing we look at before committing to paving work is drainage. With our seasonal weather cycles as they are; freeze and thaw cycles greatly affect our roads and we try to get any new pavement to last as long as possible. One of the things we are trying this year is moving curbside trash to September to try to gain extra time for construction and paving work.

Green waste seems to be going well with some continuing to put out green waste loose to the curb. After spring clean up is done we won't be collecting loose green waste anymore this season please put out a reusable container to be dumped. Brush can be piled to the curb separate and piled neat to be chipped by a separate crew. As always green waste can be brought to the highway garage anytime throughout the year and placed in the piles out back of the highway garage. Residents can also bring their trash items from their homes in town to the highway garage during our normal work hours, Monday through Thursday 6am to 4:30 pm please call ahead to schedule an appointment so we may have someone here to help unload. Items we do not accept are tires, batteries, household chemicals, used oil, we will accept electronics for recycling. Please remove the root ball from any brush placed to the curb for pick-up we will not be able to put the material through the chipper. Things have been much better with leaving trash outside the doors after hours. We are still finding some piles at times outside the doors after a weekend or overnight. Do not leave anything outside the doors after highway department hours.

#### FROM THE OFFICE OF BUILDING & CODES

#### **IMPORTANT REMINDERS Building Permits:**

When in doubt if you need a permit to do certain home improvements, please take a minute to email the codes office to ask. Most small projects do not need a permit unless it involves structural changes or plumbing and electrical installations. You can also go to townofdeerfield.org to get Applications, forms, and links for more information. Inspections: With the building season gearing up, please remember that inspections MUST be made at certain phases of your construction. These inspections phases will be provided with your Building Permit. The Town of Deerfield Rules and Regulations for the Administration and Enforcement of the Building Code makes the OWNER, APPLICANT, OR HIS/HER CONTRACTOR responsible for informing the Code Office when work is ready for inspection and to schedule such inspections. These Regulations do not allow a CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY (CO) OR COMPLIANCE CERTIFICATE (CC) to be issued unless the necessary inspections have occurred. THEREFORE, IF THE INSPECTIONS ON YOUR PERMIT ARE NOT PERFORMED. NO C.O OR C.C. WILL BE ISSUED FOR YOUR PROJECT. Swimming Pools: Please note that many residents bought inflatable pools last year. These pools have the same safety rules and regulations as other above /in ground pools, so please call us before purchasing any inflatable pools this year. More importantly, local laws regarding fencing and other safety requirements for swimming pools may be more restrictive than requirements for swimming pools contained in the Uniform Code. If you are considering the purchase of a swimming pool, you should review the Uniform Code provisions which can be obtained at the

Building & Codes Office. In addition, you should consult the building inspector on the local laws, ordinances, codes, and regulations for any further requirements before purchasing a pool. Along with the permit, you will also need to call us for your final inspection before using your pool. At that time, we will process your certificate of compliance and return your deposit for the electrical inspection report. Property Maintenance: This time of year, is when we start to get complaints for high grass and weeds along with rubbish and exterior home maintenance issues this year. Please try to talk with your neighbor about issues that may affect you and your neighborhood before reaching out to the code's office. It may be that they are having temporary financial trouble or health issues instead of just being neglectful; and they might just need a helping hand rather than an official knocking on their door. However, if the latter is the problem, please do not hesitate to contact this office. The Town of Deerfield is committed to maintaining quality neighborhoods and an excellent community environment. Our citizens expect us to do everything we can in this regard. We know that this can only be achieved through the cooperation of everyone involved. Have a great summer!

## Tick Prevention & Removal

As many may have noticed the ticks are beginning to emerge again. Ticks are most active during the months of April-September. Dogs, cats, and children are very susceptible to tick bites and tick-borne diseases.

#### **Preventing a Tick Bite**

- Keep your yard free of brush, leaf piles, and tall grass.
- If in a heavily wooded area treat clothing with products containing 0.5% permethrin or a natural method of oil of lemon eucalyptus.
- · Walk in the center of trails.
- Shower soon after coming indoors from a wooded or overgrown area.
- Check children, pets, and yourself for ticks. Commons spots for tick bites include armpits, in/around ears, back of knees,

waist/groin, and even the belly button!

#### Removing a Tick

- Use tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible.
- Pull upward in a steady even manner. Avoid twisting or rubbing the tick as this may cause the mouth to break off and remain in the skin.
- If the mouth breaks off attempt to remove it with the tweezers. If you are unable to remove it cleanse the area with soap and water or rubbing alcohol and leave it alone.
- Dispose of the tick by placing it in a sealed bag or covered container filled with rubbing alcohol. Place in the trash.

Typically, if a tick is removed within a timely manner (<24 hrs) the risk of contracting Lyme disease is very low. Usually, no prophylactic Lyme disease treatment is indicated or needed. However, you should monitor for signs of Lyme disease which include rash, fever, fatigue, headache, muscle pain, joint swelling/pain. If you are concerned check with your healthcare provider.

Cost for resident families (those who live in the Town of Deerfield and pay taxes as such) is Free to attend. Cost for nonresident children (those who live in neighboring towns) is \$250.00 per child. There may be small fees here and there for projects or supplies. Parents will be notified in advance to these fees as the information becomes available.

Children must be 5 years of age (4 years old is allowed, providing child has attended all day – daycare or preschool) – through 13 years of age.

This program is NOT a **daycare** nor a **day camp** and **cannot** be considered as one. We provide basic supervision, and activities to your children while in the park during Park Program hours.
